ANTH& 204 : Introduction to Archaeology

Quarter Offered Spring

This course introduces students to the key concepts and methods utilized by archaeologists in the excavation, analysis, and interpretation of a variety of material evidence left by ancient societies and cultures. Students will engage in a series of practical exercises (labs) to gain hands-on experience with a variety of artifacts and techniques commonly utilized within the discipline. This class may include students from multiple sections. (Elective)

- 6. Explain the importance of laws governing the protection, collection, and preservation of historic and cultural artifacts.
